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Message from the President

The crisis caused by the spread of COVID-19 and disruptions caused by conflict showed even to the most stubborn disbelievers that our modern society is indeed globalized and diverse. It also proved that this brings vulnerabilities that we can only rectify through communication across borders. The power of language enables us to bring the world together because language is the driving force that generates and enriches our imagination and that reinforces mutual bonding.

The power of one's mother tongue is an essential basis of our life and it enables the building blocks of logical thinking.

Since its foundation in 1877 (Meiji 10), Nishogakusha University has emphasized fostering the reading ability of the students. This was clarified in the application for founding submitted by Nishogakusha in 1877. It stated that the school would focus on learning Chinese. At the same time, reading abilities would be the center of learning, also encouraging students to develop their own writing skills. In other words, Nishogakusha set as the basic principle in its education policies the learning of classics, meaning Chinese and Japanese liberal arts. This has remained unchanged over 140 years.

Regarding its international character, Nishogakusha already in 1889 (Meiji 22) accepted overseas students. Recently Nishogakusha has been launching collaborative research projects of Kangaku (the Chinese classics) together with universities in Europe, China, Korean and Taiwan. One of the challenges is to keep exploring the tradition of Nishogakusha's Shino-Japanese studies in the 21st century. Since its foundation, Nishogakusha University has been producing truly global human resources who can face society with their ability of reading and their comprehensive abilities and expressive power.

N'2030 Plan

Long Term Vision of Nishogakusha University

To commemorate its 135th anniversary, Nishogakusha University formed the N'2020 Plan and implemented it. However, the environment surrounding private education continues to change at an unexpected speed. In this era in which change makes predictions exceedingly challenging and in order to continue carrying out the university's mission in the future as well, the new long-term vision "N'2030 Plan" (a successor to the fundamental principles of the N'2020 Plan) was announced at the Nishogakusha 140th Anniversary Commemorative Ceremony held on October 10th 2017.

The three points of the N'2030 Plan

- 1 The building of a "2030 Education Policy/21st Century Education Policy" based upon our university's principles, in order to nurture students with the abilities and human nature necessary to live fully in the year 2030.
- 2 The establishment of an overall goal set to make the university, both affiliated high schools, and middle school into more excellent schools.
- 3 The improvement of the curriculum in the new era of the 21st century.

Prominent Cultural Figures & People Associated with Nishogakusha University

Founder

MISHIMA Chushu

On October 10, 1877, MISHIMA Chushu founded Nishogakusha University under the name Nishogakusha, Chinese Classics Studies Academy. Nishogakusha was named after two pine trees located in the courtyard and was referred to as tsuiju-nisho. Since then, the campus has produced numerous leaders in many circles in each of the eras – Meiji, Taisho, Showa and Heisei. Nishogakusha University educates deeply cultivated, true global citizens.

Amid internationalization, advanced informatization and other trends toward the formation of a knowledge-based society, we will develop human resources who are capable of independently thinking, judging and acting, and who can play leading roles in their respective fields, based on the deeply rooted morals in Japan.

SHIBUSAWA Eiichi, the third principal of Nishogakusha University: His Relationship with the Founder MISHIMA Chushu

SHIBUSAWA Eiichi was a great businessman representing early modern Japan. He is known today as “the father of Japanese modern economics.” Upholding “the Analects” as his lifelong guide, he aimed to balance “the Analects and the abacus,” meaning “morality and economy,” and kept pursuing “the public interest.” It is well known that he devoted himself to educational and welfare projects while being involved in the establishment and the management of numerous companies. Nishogakusha is one of the schools he was connected to. It all started through his friendship with MISHIMA Chushu, the founder of Nishogakusha. SHIBUSAWA and MISHIMA got along with each other as SHIBUSAWA’s idea of “unifying ethics and economy” and MISHIMA’s theory of “the union of morality and profit” (meaning, the two should not be separated; the true profit comes from morality) were very compatible. Their relation was deepened when SHIBUSAWA asked MISHIMA to write the epitaph for his wife, Chiyo, who passed away in 1882 (Meiji 15). In his late years, MISHIMA asked SHIBUSAWA for support on continuing Nishogakusha. By establishing the professional training college of Nishogakusha and by teaching the Analects himself SHIBUSAWA became a financial and academic supporter of Nishogakusha after the passing of MISHIMA Chushu. SHIBUSAWA became the third principal in 1919 (Taisho 8).

Prominent Cultural Figures

NATSUME Soseki

1867-1916

The representative writer of the Meiji period spent some of his youth learning at Nishogakusha. At this school, NATSUME was exposed to Chinese classics of all ages such as Records of the Grand Historian of China, Analects of Confucius, Selected Poems of the Tang Dynasty and the brief history book about emperors from Jinmu to Gokomatsu, and profoundly deepened his knowledge and culture. The quintessence of his Confucian ethics and Eastern aesthetics can be found in many of his works.

Prominent Cultural Figures

KANO Jigoro

1860-1938

KANO entered Nishogakusha in 1878. He established the Kodokan Judo Institute and devoted himself to popularizing judo. Also the founder of Dainihon Taiiku Kyokai (forerunner of the Japan Sports Association), KANO worked as the principal of the Higher Normal School and was committed to the training of human resources in educational circles. He also possessed an international character and dedicated himself to teaching foreign students from China and internationalizing judo. Additionally, he became the first Japanese member of the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

Prominent Cultural Figures

HIRATSUKA Raicho

1886-1971

HIRATSUKA, a women's liberationist, devoted herself to establishing the Bluestockings, a group of female writers, and to the suffrage movement. Around 1906, she studied Chinese classics at Nishogakusha. Being an advocate of radical ideas, she was also sympathetic to Chinese classics and explained that they are permanently and fundamentally worth being learned by young people and serve as the basis of anything new.

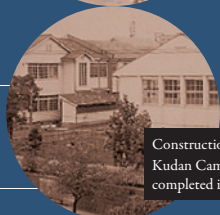

Project Android Robot of Soseki NATSUME

As part of the commemorative project for its 140th anniversary, Nishogakusha University produced an android robot of Soseki NATSUME, a literary giant who studied in Nishogakusha. The project proceeded in cooperation with Prof. Hiroshi ISHIGURO of Osaka University (supervisor), Soseki's grandson Fusanosuke NATSUME, and the Asahi Shimbun. The android robot was completed in December 2016. As Nishogakusha's special professor, he is conducting various activities, such as teaching at Junior/Senior High Schools of Nishogakusha and at Nishogakusha University. He gives speeches at ceremonies, appears as visiting lecturer, and makes appearances on TV. Based on the latest research of Japanese literature and language, Nishogakusha students have made a voice program that allows the android to read aloud. The reading-aloud sessions are offering the public a new context for Soseki NATSUME.



Faculties and Departments

Undergraduate Faculties and Departments

Students are divided into different courses in the departments in their second year and after.

Faculty of Literature	Department of Japanese Literature	This department places emphasis on the students expressing themselves to the outside world based on their profound insight in themselves. Through studying novels, poetry, theater plays, and visual images such as films, the students trace back their predecessors' expressions which leads them to truly know about themselves. In diverse works and expressions, and among all, the Japanese language itself, the students are offered to face the way they are.
	Department of Chinese Literature	The Japanese mind and thought have been under the influence of the Chinese and Korean culture that reached Japan via the Korean peninsula and continental China. In this department, the students learn mainly the Chinese culture, thought and language to deepen understanding. Additionally, courses of the Korean language and calligraphy are offered. The department also aims to foster international human resources who can play major roles in especially East Asia.
	Department of Urban Culture Design	Manga, anime, games, and other content which recently have become the pride of Japan have lead to a new tourism phenomenon similar to a religious pilgrimage. This content is being distributed globally and is creating a new culture. In this department, the students gain a theoretical understanding of the structure of modern society. The department aims to foster human resources who can practically design these structures and contribute to the cultural and tourism industries.
	Department of History and Culture	This department focuses on studying Japanese history, European and American history, and Asian history, including cultural and ideological history. Through material-analyses and fieldwork, the students approach incidents from the past and consider their impact on modern society. The department aims to foster human resources with logical thinking abilities who can play an active part in our society.
Faculty of International Politics and Economics	Department of International Politics and Economics	The aim of the department is for students to acquire knowledge about the domestic and international states of political and economic affairs and judicial administration, and based on that knowledge, become capable of understanding our complex society and the ever-changing international society from a multifaceted perspective. We also try to develop human resources that can, through learning about politics, economy, history, culture and languages of different countries and regions around the world, contribute to the international society while respecting different values.
	Department of International Business	This department values the essential capability to work at any place and any time. It aims to develop each student's potential through the acquisition of a sense in business administration and the nurturing of practical skills. Many classes apply an active learning method. From early stages on, occasions to learn practical skills in business are made available.
Special English Program		The Special English Program is available for students who wish to improve their English skills.

▶ Course in Japanese Literature	Reading from classic to contemporary works, the students will develop deep insights about them.
▶ Course in Image Arts, Drama and Media	Studying a wide range of media-works such as movies, literature, performing arts, and theater plays, the students will interpret that which is beyond language.
▶ Course in Japanese Language	Studying the “past” and the “present” of Japanese language usage, the students will gain “understanding” they lacked before.
▶ Course in Chinese Literature and Japanese <i>Kanbun</i>	Various classes are offered for the students to understand Chinese literature and thought. By reading “ <i>Kanbun</i> ” the students will be learning about the core of Japanese liberal arts and culture.
▶ Course in Chinese and Korean Language	This course aims to improve the students’ proficiency in the Chinese and Korean language by being exposed to their cultural aspects.
▶ Course in Chinese Calligraphy	This course fosters the basis to pursue calligraphy from the three angles of practical skills, theory, and surrounding areas.
▶ Course in Cultural Contents	In this course, the students will understand the current state of multimedia society academically and develop their skills to create and distribute content.
▶ Course in Tourism and Media	In this course, the students will academically examine digital transformations in tourism and other leading examples and carry out various projects while cooperating with companies and local governments.
▶ Course in Global Japanese	In this course, the students will understand the past and present of Japanese culture, and will gain international communication skills to share this knowledge with the world.
▶ Course in Japanese History	In this course, the students are to study Japanese history through extensive reading of materials from classic to modern works.
▶ Course in Western and Asian History	In this course, the students will learn to observe and interpret global phenomena from a broad point of view.
▶ Course in Intellectual and Cultural History	In this course, the students will learn historically about thought, geography, and performing arts in order to understand universal cultural activities.
▶ Course in International Politics	Learn the theories and history and analyze the current facts to correctly interpret complex international politics.
▶ Course in International Economics	Learn economics and business and become capable of analyzing the international economy.
▶ Course in Law and Administration	Curriculums designed to develop human resources equipped with knowledge about laws and legal mindset, which is required for civil servants and those with an equivalent job.
▶ Course in International Business	Learn the essence of business and establish principles that cannot be swayed by the times or international differences.

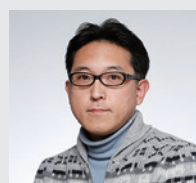

Nishogakusha started as a small Kangaku school and thus it has a rich academic tradition rooted in Chinese studies, or Sinology. Kangaku requires a rational way of thinking to comprehend reality based on accumulated intelligence and knowledge and to attempt to solve problems from a broad perspective.

The spirit of comprehensive human studies that has been here since the founding of Nishogakusha, has been passed on as Oriental Studies.

The graduate school consists of two sections: Japanese literature and Chinese studies. We are proud to be among the best in Japan with our variety of courses and excellent academic staff. In the Japanese literature section, research fields cover literature from ancient times up to today as well as the Japanese language itself. In the Chinese section, the research fields cover the thought, literature, and language from ancient times to the present. The school also offers diverse courses such as

comparative literature, media theory, performing arts culture, and Japanese language education. All of these are designed to research and gain multidimensional knowledge and insights.

In the first part of the PhD program (the Master's program) each student works to achieve an original and unique research, resulting in writing a Master's thesis. Taking required credits enables the applicants to obtain a teaching license (of Japanese, calligraphy, and Chinese) for junior and senior high school. In the second part of the PhD program (the Doctoral program), each candidate pursues higher research results and completes his/her dissertation.

Recently, consociating with overseas graduate schools has been promoted. With its ideal international research environment and its excellent location, the graduate school offers the students to develop themselves as researchers and as individuals.

"Cultivation of character through the spirit of the East" — Nishogakusha, which began as a school for learning Chinese classics, has upheld these words as a philosophy throughout the more than 140 years since its founding. In April 2022, we established the new Graduate School of Global Japanese Studies as the stage for multifaceted research both from the East to Japan and from Japan to the East, largely from the perspective of social sciences and humanities. We are currently living in an age where the global movement of people, things, capital, and information is accelerating due to the spread of the Internet and various forms of social media. In

this increasingly fluid society, themes continue to appear that should be taken up as research, including the distribution of literature, manga, anime, games, and other content and the composition of popular culture created by fans of this content, as well as the effects of anime pilgrimages and content tourism planned across Japan. In the Graduate School of Global Japanese Studies, students can move forward with research under the guidance of a diverse range of professors specializing in Japanese culture, comparative cultures, tourism culture, and more. Students can also design their futures as the researchers or businesspeople they wish to be.

In the Graduate School of International Politics and Economics, students will learn the practical knowledge and problem-solving skills necessary to survive in the future global society based on a deep understanding of international society, focused mainly on East Asia. In courses related to international politics and the international economy, students will study theoretical framework and historical knowledge to gain a deep insight into changes of each subject. In courses related to international management, students will learn about theories and practical skills needed to seize business chances in the turbulent economic society. The graduate course is open to a wide-range of working students through which they can attend classes on weekday

evenings and Saturdays. Enrollees can review their practical experience in a theoretical framework and improve the quality of their daily work. A one-year course is also available to working students. Students can also develop problem-solving abilities coupled with creativity through their own research programs (Master's thesis or specific programs) in the school's small-sized class system. By having students gain a wide range of practical knowledge and superior problem-solving abilities in this way, we strive to develop human resources capable of playing an active role and showcasing their abilities in the field of their choosing after program completion.
